FCPS is in the final stages of preparing next year's FY 2021 Proposed Budget. The Superintendent will release the Proposed Budget FY 2021 to the School Board on January 9, 2020. On November 26th a joint meeting was held with the Fairfax County Government and Fairfax Public School representatives to present the budget forecast. Many meetings will be held with the community, the School Board and the Board of Supervisors before the final budget will be approved in May, 2020.

Meanwhile in Richmond Governor Northam proposed a \$1.2 billion investment in K-12 Education, one of the largest single increases for at-risk schools in Virginia history. His proposal raises teacher salaries 3 percent, funds more school counselors, and new staff support for English language learners. The Governor's Budget allocates \$59.5 million for the Virginia Preschool Initiative to increase early childhood education for at-risk four-year old's also. Governor Northam places great emphasis on early childhood education. He said, "Where we end up in life has a lot to do with where we start."

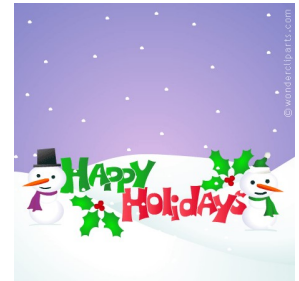
HOLIDAY EVENTS

Live musical entertainment will be played too for your enjoyment. Food is available also.



Another event going on until January 5, 2020 is Season's Greetings at the United States Botanic Gardens in Washington, D.C. The exhibit features model train and replicas of some famous buildings, monuments and landmarks in the Capital Region. A new theme each year focuses on a different part of American life.

The theme for 2019 is "America's Gardens." The exhibition explores famous conservatories, fountains, and arboretums from across the United States.
